

KEY FINDINGS

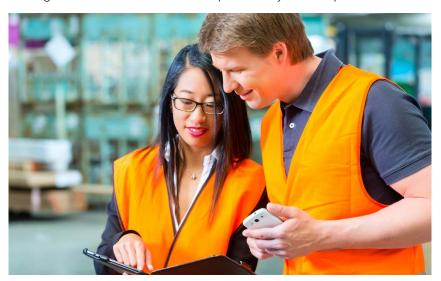

NATIONAL JOB INDEX Another month of impressive growth

The Transport Logistics and Supply Chain employment market enjoyed another impressive month of growth with the Labourforce Impex Job Index rising 4.6% to 114.66 in September. To put this in perspective the ANZ Bank recently reported that their Job Advertisement Series had risen for the last four months, 7.6% in the last twelve month. Our TL&SC Job Index has risen 14.7% over the same period and by 7.3% in the last three months alone. **This is encouraging news for those working for the airlines or Australia Post whose jobs may be under threat**. outperformed the 4.1% rise in Temporary and Contract opportunities. The Permanent Job Index now sits at 110.92, a rise of nearly 11% in a year. The Temporary and Contract market has performed even stronger, rising 28% to 128.05 over twelve months.

The Transport, Logistics and Supply Chain sector continues to outperform the overall Australian employment market. Just as we reported last month that economists are starting to dampen their forecasts for 2015 the Economists at the ANZ are becoming more bullish on employment, suggesting that unemployment will fall below 6% in the medium term.

For once the Permanent Job Index increase of 4.8% (narrowly)

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CHART 1 NATIONAL INDEX AND JOB TYPE ANALYSIS

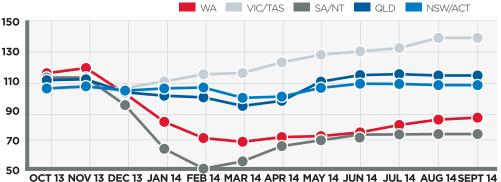

STATE ANALYSIS Strong growth in Eastern states. Victoria spectacular

All states and sectors enjoyed an increase in the number of job vacancies advertised in September. These ranged from a massive 6.4% in Victoria and 5.8% in Queensland to 1.6% in Western Australia and 2.1% in SA/NT. The latter two states are the laggards. Over a 12-month period WA vacancies have fallen 15.5% while SA/ NT have fallen exactly 25%. Having said that, as the graph clearly shows, both have at least recovered some ground in the last six months after weak Q1 2014. Things are going much better in the Eastern states. Victoria's performance has been spectacular, growing 47% in 12 months to 147.05. NSW, with growth of 10.5% and Queensland 19.4% have both performed very strongly and seem to be pulling ahead again after a relatively quiet mid year period.

CHART 2 COMPARISON OF STATE JOB INDICES

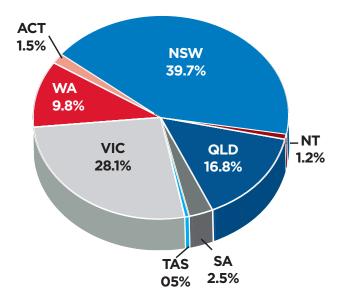

Yet again Victoria is the big winner with its share now at 28.1% reflecting the state's strong growth in employment opportunities in Transport, Logistics and Supply Chain in the state over the past year. Its share 12 months ago was 22.9%. For the first time WA's share has fallen below 10%. A year ago it held 14.3% and is now only 9.8%.



OCCUPATIONAL ANALYSIS

11% boost for Air, Sea and Rail Transport

In September Air, Sea and Rail Transport job advertising volumes back flipped! The 11% rise wiping out the 5.8% fall the previous month. Other occupations were more stable. TL&SC clerical and managerial roles both flat lined in September but there was healthy growth in job opportunities for road transport workers and particularly Storespersons and Freight Handlers, climbing another 8.6% after a more subdued August.

We now have accumulated twelve months of data and can

see clearer medium trends appearing. The most obvious of these is the phenomenal growth in Stores and Freight roles. Very many of these roles are temporary and casual in nature but nonetheless still very impressive.

Only TL&SC Management job advertising volumes are below the 100 benchmark set last September. The Index sits at 86.27, a 13.7% fall in vacancies over twelve months. By way of comparison Clerical roles have grown 3.6% in twelve months.

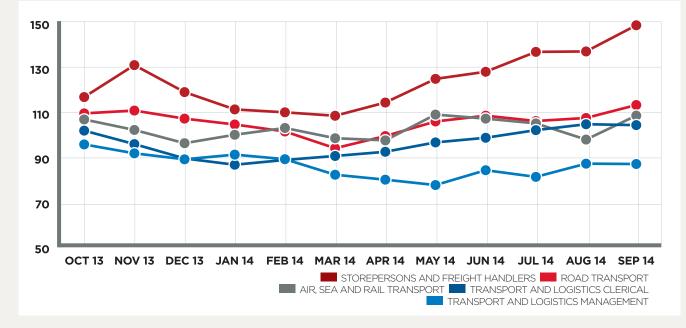


CHART 4 ANALYSIS OF JOB ADVERTISEMENTS BY SPECIALIST OCCUPATION

INDUSTRY ANALYSIS

Retail and Wholesale - up nearly 25% in 6 months

The pickup in demand amongst Retail and Wholesale employers from the low in April continues with no sign of stopping. The Index has risen 24.8% in the last six months. Ironically the Index now is just back to 101.34 so this may well represent a seasonal pattern of, as reported above, largely temporary and casual stores and freight staff building.

Interestingly a not dissimilar pattern can also be seen in Public Admin, Health and Education but the trend is more based upon budgetary cut backs than seasonal downturns.Three industries have enjoyed a very positive twelve months and their indices are broadly aligned. These are Transport and Logistics, Professional, Scientific and Technical and, more surprisingly Manufacturing. All indices hover around the 125.0 mark. Given the structural issues facing the manufacturing sector it is hard to explain the rise in demand in Manufacturing. The growth, however, amongst Transport and Logistics companies is great news for the sector.

Even the Mining, Utilities and Construction sectors still, at 107.09, sit above the 100 benchmark established twelve months ago reflecting the balance between Mining weakness and strength in the Construction sector.

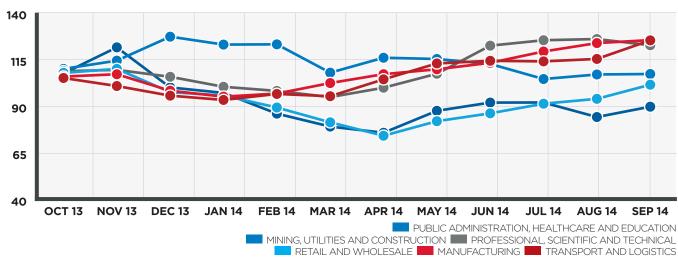


CHART 5 ANALYSIS OF JOB ADVERTISEMENTS BY INDUSTRY

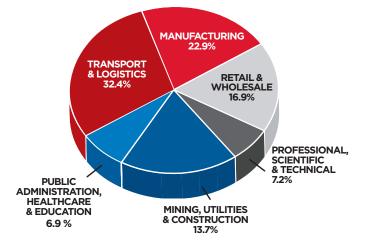


CHART 6 THE PROPORTION OF JOB ADVERTISEMENTS BY INDUSTRY SEPTEMBER 2014

With twelve months of data now accumulated the principal trend has been for Transport and Logistics employers and Manufacturing employers to represent an increasing proportion of the national market. Their respective shares have grown 1.9% and 1.5% from a year ago, largely at the expense of Mining, Utilities and Construction which has fallen 2.4% from a 16.1% share last September.
